But if you met Meghety today, all you would see is her wonderful smile. She would tell you how much she loves visiting her favourite place in the world, our very own Sunnydale Community Centre.

But it wasn't that long ago that Meghety could hardly get out of bed, she was so depressed. Each day was a struggle. "Every day, she stayed at home. She would stay in bed. She didn't want to do anything," said her mother, Zapour.



Meghety, now 29, lives with significant developmental challenges. While fluent in Arabic and Armenian, she is still learning English. This makes it hard to communicate and even harder to make friends.

But one day, Meghety discovered Sunnydale Community Centre and her life was transformed.

Nazmi, one of our incredible team members, saw Meghety's potential and signed her up as a volunteer. Ever since, Sunnydale has become Meghety's home away from home and a bright spot in her day.

Every day, families like Meghety's come through our doors because they have nowhere else to go. For some, it's about finding a place to belong and grow. For others, it's about receiving the basic support they need to survive. In each case, it's a lifeline.

Meghety takes pride in her volunteer work. She knows that she is making a difference.

She's also excited to be able to bring home food to her own family. She has found a purpose to her days, and nothing can keep her away.

"I love everything about Sunnydale. I like to help," said Meghety. "I love Marwa, Nazmi, Ola, and Maggie – they are all my friends here."

Since joining the team as a volunteer, Meghety has also enjoyed participating in other programs. She comes for the weekly Digital Technology program – and often helps others, as this is an area where she shines.

That, along with the sewing program and English conversation group, gives Meghety so many opportunities to be part of a community. She loves being part of Sunnydale because she can work on her independence, including walking by herself to the centre.

"Every day, she says she wants to come, to see her friends, and do her job," said Zapour. "She started coming here and began to take better care of herself. She has more confidence, and feels at home here."

The life that Meghety and her family live today is in stark contrast to the journey they endured to get here. Twelve years ago they fled war-torn Syria, hoping for a better life.



When they lived in Syria, Meghety attended a special needs school, and had many hobbies, including crochet and bowling, even competing on a Special Olympics team.

## But when the war started, the peaceful life they once knew was gone forever.

"We lived in Syria for one year without electricity or heat," said Zapour. "It was very cold in the winter. We only left our home when we had to. It wasn't safe."

The family fled to Lebanon, where they lived for a few years, waiting for permission to come to Canada, where relatives were waiting as sponsors.

"It was terrible there. The people in Lebanon hated people from Syria. But Meghety, she was happy – she made friends there. When we came to Canada, it was hard for her.

"She couldn't find any way to be happy."

There are so many other families like Meghety's, leaving behind the world they once knew. They have to start over. <u>But how can they begin again without help? Without hope?</u>

These families are struggling to survive and need your support to create a safe place for them to land.

"When Meghety is happy, I am happy," said Zapour. "I know she is okay."
